ANOTHER DEDICATION AT MICHIGAN CITY, IND.

St. Stanislaus Church Ready for Dedication

Today, October 24th, the Right Rev. Bishop of Fort Wayne Diocese, John F. Noll, will officiate at the solemn dedication of St. Stanislaus' new church, which has been erected under the supervision of the pastor, Rev. Joseph Bolka. The parishioners are very enthusiastic in making preparations for this great event, an achievement of which they may be justly proud.

The energetic Father Bolka, its present pastor, took charge of the parish March 10, 1909. During his successful pastorate, land was purchased for the site of the present beautiful church. In spite of hardships and difficulties, this pastor as a good shepherd labored devotedly for his flock and succeeded admirably.

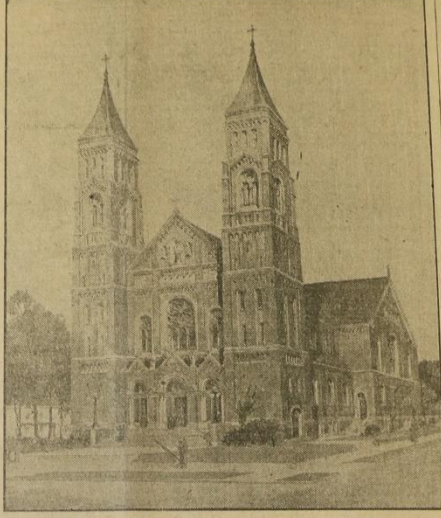
In the beginning of its existence, the parish built a combination building on the corner of Washington and Ripley streets, which was used as church and school for many years, but as the parish continued to grow, the need of a larger and more commodious church was felt. To satisfy this dire need, lots were purchased south of the old church with the hope that a new church should soon grace the center of Michigan City, Ind. In the summer of 1916 the foundation for the present magnificent church was started and the corner stone was solemnly laid Sept. 28, 1916, by the Right Rev. Archbishop, Joseph Weber, Superior of the C. R. Fathers in America. In a short time the basement church was ready for occupancy, and the first Holy Mass was celebrated on Candemas Day by Rev. Joseph Bolka.

Since the basement church was to serve as a temporary church, the zealous pastor labored with untiring patience to complete the stately structure. In a short time he succeeded in paying off the parish debt.

Then with new zeal he undertook to complete the upper church. The old plans were revised and work on the exterior was resumed in the spring of 1923. Owing to a lack of funds, the interior remained unfinished, until, in 1926 came the grand "Pinnacle" and as a result of many willing hands and generous purses, stands out the church in its full splendor.

It is a stone and pressed face brick structure located on the corner of two fine residential streets, Washington and Ann. The seating capacity of the church is 1,000. The interior is finished in "Italian Romanesque" style; the semi-circular arch is fully represented in this structure, with gigantic columns conspicuous for their grace, symmetry and beauty. The sanctuary is large and well lighted; the sacristies, rooms; and the choir stand out prominently. It is large and can accommodate many singers. The Rev. Pastor is contemplating installing a large, tubular-pneumatic organ, which will be among the finest of its kind in the country. The parishioners are keenly interested in this project and are anxious to contribute towards the organ, for which they expect to pay in full in the near future.

The church is practically paid for. The edifice is not only an ornament to the whole city, but it is also a splendid monument to all who took an active part in making its construction possible.

Pres. Calles Ordered Arrest of Hundreds

Archbishop Vera of Puebla Made Prisoner, Chambers of Commerce Suppressed, Reign of Terror Spreading.

Mexico City—Reports reaching here tell of rebel uprisings in no fewer than eight States of Mexico. In some cases they are small, in others the bands have defeated considerable forces of Federal troops.

As a result, the Government has taken extraordinary and summary measures in half a dozen directions. Federal arrests of suspects go upward daily and a score of the larger cities of the Republic and numerous smaller towns are experiencing a reign of terror.

Archbishop Vera of Puebla has been arrested, brought here and lodged in a military prison, according to the Imparcial, Mexico City paper. On the following day the government issued a denial, saying that the Archbishop was in Puebla, unmolested. It was not denied that over a dozen Catholic priests have been seized.

Arms Importation Watched.

One sign of the Government's alarm is an order issued by President Calles recently forbidding the importation of rifles, pistols and cartridges, lest they fall into the hands of rebels and other anti-Government groups. Customs officials have been ordered to enforce the new decree strictly.

Another example of the harshness of the Government—which many interpret as fright—is the summary dissolution by Government decree of the chambers of commerce of the States of Jalisco and Durango for no more serious reason than that they petitioned Calles to relieve the economic stress of the country. The order of the Secretary of Commerce, Industry and Labor, issued at the direction of Calles, declares that this act of the chambers was seditious since it tended to make business uneasy.

Despite the fate of the two commercial bodies, the chamber of commerce of Vera Cruz, Mexico's greatest port, has just sent a memorial to Calles endorsing the Jalisco chamber's petition and declaring that it acts "because the commercial situation in this port is just as bad, with marked tendencies of growing worse." The chamber "respectfully asks" Calles "to take every measure in your power to grant the petition of both chambers." It is momentarily expected that the Vera Cruz chamber also will be dissolved.
